

Round 1 Funded Coalitions

Coalition	Description
Benton County Youth Coalition	The coalition will implement four school-based programs including the Too Good for Drugs and Violence program, the Truth Project's VAPING: KNOW THE TRUTH online course, and a mental health course to middle and high school students (est. 2,400 students reached), along with the What About Marijuana? program for high school students in 3 county school districts. The coalition will also conduct various community presentations, forums and social media messages (est. 7,000 reached).
Butler County We Can Be Drug Free Coalition	The coalition will partner with Boys and Girls Club to implement the Guiding Good Choices program (est. 13 families reached) and Life Skills Training program (est. 532 students reached) as well as recruit 3 youth participants from Boys and Girls Club to join the We Can Be Drug Free Coalition.
Caldwell County Cares Coalition	The coalition will implement Too Good for Drugs and/or Peacebuilders in 7 schools within 3 counties to K-8th grades, increase membership in a high school leadership group by adding 3 representatives from at least half the high schools, and host a "Be Bold Youth Leadership Symposium" to educate youth on protective factors, refusal skills, health and wellbeing around substance use. The coalition will also assist schools with development of an awareness/education campaign for their school and implement a media campaign (plus a townhall meeting) to enhance community norms around youth substance use.
Charleston C2000	The coalition will train facilitators to implement the Strengthening Families program (est. 25 families reached) as well as provide the Second Step curriculum for 90% of elementary and middle school students in the Charleston School District.
Community Connections	The coalition will implement the Strengthening Families curriculum (est. 5,250 reached), conduct at least 6 community education events (such as Communities Talk) (est. 4,000 reached), and implement the Not on Tobacco program.
Fresh Start	The coalition will implement the Active Parenting: First Five Years program (est. reach 45 families), increase coalition membership by 10, and provide educational materials at 5 community events.
Greene County Tobacco and Vape Prevention Coalition	The coalition will work with local higher education institutions to improve tobacco policies on campus-owned property, to implement the Tobacco Free Wellness Ambassador Program, install permanent vape drop boxes, and coordinate two community events with mobile vape drop boxes.
Healthy Dent County Prevention Coalition	The coalition will implement the Too Good for Drugs program to all 6th, 7th and 8th graders in the county (est. reach of 525 students and 900 parents) and work to prepare the coalition for an April 2023 federal grant application (est. reach of 85 persons).
Iron County Health Coalition	The coalition will implement the Strengthening Families program (est. 60 families reached), conduct alcohol and tobacco retailer training (est. 8 vendors reached), two community awareness and education campaigns (including "It's Up To Me"), as well as register with CADCA and become a 501c3 organization to bolster their professionalism and capacity.
Lafayette County Brighter Futures Mental Health Consortium	The coalition will implement the Strengthening Families curriculum (est. 50 families reached), distribute educational materials to community-based organizations in order increase pro-social behavior and family bonding, and create a central information system on social media/text to inform families about resources.
Lincoln County Drug & Alcohol Reduction Team (DART)	The coalition will provide tobacco/vaping retailer training to 75% of e-cigarette retailers, coordinate compliance checks at all e-cigarette retailers, and educate through printed materials and a media campaign (est. 5,000 reached). The coalition will also conduct a community needs assessment including one focus group/listening session in each school district and five key informant interviews (est. 200 reached), and increase youth involvement on the coalition by adding one youth representative from each school district as active members (est. 50 reached).

Osage County Anti-Drug Community Action Team (OCADCAT)	The coalition will expand the Too Good for Drugs program into additional schools (K-6th grades) in the county (est. 3,000 students reached), implement the Guiding Good Choices program for high-risk youth care providers identified by Drug Court and conduct a media campaign to promote a drug-free lifestyle and positive parenting (SAMHSA's Talk They Hear You campaign) (est. 70,000 impressions/week).
Pettis County Adolescent Health Coalition	The coalition will implement a positive youth development program at 3 county high schools (Botvin Life Skills), train 2 student representatives from 75% of the schools in peer-to-peer prevention strategies, and conduct a survey and a focus group to gauge community readiness to address prevention needs.
St. Joseph Drug-Free Community Coalition	The coalition plans to expand their prevention efforts into two adjacent counties (Nodaway and Andrew) and will start by completing a comprehensive community assessment and seeking to expand membership from individuals within the new counties (est. 50 reached). The coalition also plans to implement the Communities Mobilizing for Change on Alcohol program and Search Institute's developmental asset-building activities (est. 127,168 reached). The coalition will conduct an e-cigarette-focused media campaign (est. 75,000 reached).
Stone County Community Health Coalition (SCCHC)	The coalition will implement the Marijuana Education Initiative in 4th-6th grades (est. 2,640 reached), increase the coalition's membership up to 2 representatives per sector (minimum of 24 active members), and send 3 members to the meetings of two other Stone County organizations/groups in order to strengthen collaboration and community support.
Webster County Community Partnership	The coalition will install three permanent medication drop boxes, promote their location and use to the community, assist medication distribution providers and end-of-life service providers in providing education to consumers on medication disposal and opportunities for it (i.e. destruction pouches and drop boxes) (est. 100 reached), and conduct presenter trainings (Generation Rx) to 10+ civic organizations, community service providers, and/or youth leaders who will hold 5 community trainings on medication misuse and proper disposal (est. 100 reached).
Round 2 Funded Coalitions	
Charleston C2000	The coalition will implement the Strengthening Families program (est. 15-17 families) as well as provide the Second Step curriculum in elementary and middle school students in the Charleston School District.
Fresh Start	The coalition will continue to implement the Active Parenting: First Five Years program (est. reach 55 families), increase coalition membership by 5, and provide educational materials at 5 community events.
St. Joseph Drug-Free Community Coalition	The coalition will implement the Communities Mobilizing for Change on Alcohol program, develop a media campaign to address both youth alcohol and electronic cigarette use, and coordinate compliance checks for alcohol and tobacco sales.
St. Francois County Community Partnership	The coalition will implement the Too Good for Drugs and Prevention Plus Wellness programs to 6th-12th grades in the 2022-2023 and 2023-2024 school years within 5 school districts.
Andrew County Health and Safety Coalition	The coalition plans to implement the Communities That Care model to address their identified needs of youth alcohol, cigarette, and other drug misuse. They will conduct a community assessment, build stakeholder engagement, implement a media campaign, and utilize the CTC tools to create a comprehensive community prevention plan.
